 NCRL shared with Amanda that they'd like to have a revised copy of the inter-local agreement back to her by the meeting on the 25th. Both parties have decided that because this involves some budgeting it should not launch before January 1st, with the 2019 budget.
- Chewelah Roof The bid process for the Chewelah roof went smoothly and the Library District (and the City of Chewelah) selected J.U Contracting. In the walk-through on August 24, all three bidders strongly suggested that the Library replace the entire roof in order to keep the seam stable, to upgrade insulation, and to keep the roof on the same replacement schedule. As per the District's purchasing policy, Amanda signed a contract with J.U Contracting for a total of \$28,481.72. They began work on Monday, October 1, 2018. The scope of work asks that the roofing project be completed by October 31, 2018. The Trustees called for a vote to ratify the signing of the contract.

This subject will be discussed at the next regular meeting.

<u>Library Director's Report</u> September 2018 (Presented at the October 4, 2018 meeting)

Information Sharing - Amanda

- Amanda and Katy Pike, Manager at Kettle Falls, have been providing information to the Kettle Falls Library Board
 and the Kettle Falls City Council regarding annexation. They met with the Kettle Falls Board chair, Valda
 Pancoast, and then with the whole board and a City Council representative at their regular meeting on
 September 17. The goal of the meetings are to inform the board and City Council about annexation so that they
 are better informed while making budgetary and planning decisions. Amanda has also been invited to a City
 Council meeting to further discuss this.
- Amanda participated in a Broadband Action Team webinar on emerging rural broad technologies. While some of
 these technologies are still in the developmental stage, it was hopeful and encouraging to see that there are
 some new, and affordable, trends emerging.
- Amanda has been working with the Libraries of Stevens County Foundation and the Providence-Mt. Carmel Reach Out and Read Program (ROR). The ROR program has started at the Colville clinic. Dr. Katrina Gardener is overseeing the project and has shared that 100% of physicians at the Kettle Falls, Colville, and Chewelah clinics have agreed to participate. The Foundation donated \$1,500 in order to get the program off the ground. Additional community organizations have also committed to giving money.

Chewelah from Bryan Tidwell

- Fall is upon us, and things have begun to quiet down in Chewelah now that school is back in session.
- I've been spending a lot of time this month trying to reach into some outlying communities around Chewelah, and I look forward to continuing to network in areas like Valley, Addy and Blue Creek this fall.
- As far as programming goes, we've come to the end of our Backyard Wilderness exhibit, including a very successful Bioblitz event up at the Chewelah Peak Learning Center. Families explored trails together and found everything from snakes to scat, and everyone had a good time.
- We were grateful to host a speaker from Humanities Washington last week to speak on the history of conspiracy theories in American politics and how it affects us today. The presentation was very well done.
- Additionally, things look positive for facilities improvements at Chewelah and we'll go forward with those in the coming weeks.

Colville from Sarah English

Our final Summer Reading Program numbers for the county are in and there is much to sing about! We had the
most children finish (341) and most documented teen/adult signups (746) since at least 2013.
 Readers Digest version:

Children Sign Ups: 1060 (up 40--4%--from last year's 1020) *2nd highest since 2013's 1,090 Children Finishers: 341 (up 19--6%--from last year's 322) *most finishers since at least 2013

Teen/Adult Sign Ups: 746 (up 250--50%--from last year's documented 496) *most documented sign ups since at least 2013

Teen/Adult Finishers: 247 (down 54--18%--from last year's 301) *2nd highest finishers since at least 2013 Program Attendees: 523 (up 36--7%--from 2016 [2017 featured informal come-and-go programs where attendance was not tracked]) *3rd highest since at least 2014

• How many people did it take to install the Improvement Club's new display cases? One maintenance person, three water/sewer staff, and one building engineer. They conquered soft wood, weak walls and an asymmetrical wall space to get them hung. We are looking forward to welcoming back artists and collectors to share their talents and treasures with us.

- We are in the middle of a successful partnership with the US Forest Service. We offer public computers and they offer staff to walk job-seekers through the application process. Six people came to the first event. The next event is October 2.
- Our efforts to hold a Prime Time program in Colville have not been as successful. The Humanities Washington
 program, which fosters reading skills while providing a meal, travel reimbursement and gift cards to participants,
 has been slow to get off the ground. In collaboration with the state program director I hope to meet with school
 personnel to determine how our kids can get connected with this program and its benefits.
- The next time you pick up Washington State Magazine, don't be surprised if you see an article about the Libraries of Stevens County. A reporter working on a story about how public libraries enrich our communities heard about the pumpkin that was grown at the Chewelah Public Library in 2015 and in the process of learning more discovered our Lorax Club. If travel is approved the reporter will be in town October 5 for the next gathering of the Lorax Club.
- Some programming heads up (in addition to our "normal" activities):
 October 10, 2-4 pm: Decorate Your SRP Bag--add some bling to your bag!
 October 22, 3:30: Lady Long Rider--Bernice Ende and her horse make a return visit to Stevens County after criss-crossing America, and they both have stories to tell
 October 24, 5 pm: Author Bruce Holbert--the Washington Book Award winner will read from his latest, Whiskey, and meet fans and sign books afterwards

Hunters from Megan Bush

- We've had a couple special events in Hunters in the last month or so. I had a 'DIY Superhero Mask' craft and did
 my first Bullet Journal class. I had one child participate in the mask program and two adults attend the journal
 class. I'm looking forward to Raine's program 'Creepers & Curiosities' on Halloween the kids adore her and are
 excited for all the fun she has planned for them.
- Since the school year started up again at Columbia, I've had a couple requests for students that I've dropped off at the school library for them. I've also had several students sign up for library cards.
- I'm still tracking foot traffic for every open day in Hunters. September ended up being a fairly steady month with an average patron count of 24/day.

- Things have been quiet this month. Since we had staff gone and sick at a couple of our branches.
- I am happy to report that Melinda got married!
